PASTORAL PROGRAMME

Our Pastoral Team work exceptionally hard to provide an excellent level of support to our students via various channels. We work closely with students and staff to identify the need for pastoral intervention or support and provide this via internal mentoring, group work and external support via professionals and programmes. These are wide-ranging and allow us to offer a breadth of support aligned to the needs of our students.

On a daily basis, Form Time gives students time with their tutors and we use this time for a range of activities aimed at strengthening that relationship and embedding some of our school's fundamentals. This also gives students the opportunity to raise any general questions or queries they may have about the day.



The activities for these sessions are timetabled and consistent across the school, comprising:

- 1 x Behaviour Curriculum
- 1 x Year Assembly
- 1 x SMSC session (Picture News)
- 1 x VOICE Update
- 1x Numeracy
- 5x Reading opportunities (am form times)

In addition to daily Form Time, we also benefit from Assemblies, which are delivered by the Senior Team, Heads of Year and guest speakers throughout the year covering a range of topics and providing important information to students.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) are fundamental to creating a positive and effective learning environment for all.

We aim to do this by:

Creating an inclusive and equitable environment

- Ensuring that every student is treated fairly and has the same opportunities to succeed, regardless of their background, culture, beliefs, age, gender, race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, or any other protected characteristic. For example, extra support is provided for some of our disadvantaged students who wish to apply for leadership roles.
- Fostering an environment where every individual feels valued, respected, and has a strong sense of belonging within the school community.
- Providing facilities and resources that are accessible to all, including students with disabilities. In addition, ensuring that schemes of learning within the curriculum reflect a range of experiences, backgrounds and perspectives.

Enhancing Learning and Development

- Exposing students to diverse perspectives and opinions helps them develop critical thinking skills, challenge their own beliefs and gain a broader understanding of the world. All curriculum areas offer opportunities to explore these as well as the use of resources such as Picture News which focuses on a 'big question' linked to current affairs.
- Equipping students with the skills and understanding needed to thrive in an increasingly interconnected and diverse global society and workforce.
- Recognising and celebrating the unique ideas, strengths, experiences and cultures that individuals bring to our school community. Our student EDI group regularly produce materials that aim to promote festivals, celebrations, national and global events.

Students of the Equality, Diversity and Inclusion group ensure that everyone within our school community is treated fairly and with equity. They recognise that some of their responsibilities include:

PUPIL LEADERSHIP TEAM (PLT)

Our Pupil Leadership Team (PLT) was established in 2019 and is now in its sixth year. The PLT enables every student in the school to have a voice. Students in Year 8 apply and are shortlisted by the previous PLT prior to undertaking an interview with a senior member of staff and students from the previous years' committee. Once selected, the newly formed committee then democratically elect a Chair and Vice Chair.

What do they do?

The aim of the committee is to be role models within our school community and carry out projects which link directly to improving the student experience at RBA. Meeting every month, the team set the agenda, taking points from the Whole School Development Plan and student community. Some of their work includes reporting to school governors and the senior leadership team, running school election, assemblies, form time activities, Eco club, supporting our younger Year 5 students out on their playground, helping at some whole events such as parents' evenings, break out area design and new staff recruitment student panels.

CAREERS & ELECTIVES PROGRAMME

At Robert Bloomfield Academy, we want all our young people to understand the full range of opportunities available to them in today's world and help them to acquire the skills and qualifications they will need to succeed in the workplace today and in the future. We believe that every student should have multiple opportunities to learn from employers about work, employment and the skills that are valued in the workplace. We also aim to prepare our students for the opportunities in the next stage of their education, a time when they will make choices about their future study.

All students at RBA will receive careers education throughout the course of the year in the form of an Aspirations Programme:

- 2 dedicated weeks per year where careers become the focus of all lessons across the curriculum
- Subject Leaders will plan and provide activities which educate the students on the careers and future pathways available to them within that subject field.
- Visiting speakers (past students and local people) will provide students with opportunities to hear and ask questions about careers and future pathways.
- KS3 Careers Fair – An opportunity for students to discover information about different career paths and future options from an array of industries.

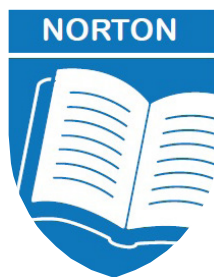


What is the Year 8 Electives Programme?

OUR HOUSE SYSTEM



Our House System at RBA was created in 2019 with the creation of 4 houses (Turing, Miller, Norton and Abrahams) whose icons are both inspirational and known locally.

We wanted to create a House system that was inclusive, competitive and encouraged a team ethos amongst all year groups of students and staff. Our House system took off with great success with a huge array of House competitions in all subject areas, thousands of pounds raised for our four house charities and inclusion of all students and staff in the school.

There are two form groups per year group in each house with year eight House captains leading the form reps in each class to motivate and encourage the students to fully embrace all that RBA has to offer. The vertical house groups allow students to build a camaraderie between all of the ages and allows the older year groups to act as role models to the younger ones.

What do the students get out of the House System?

Students are able to take part in a huge range of house competitions from sports competitions such as Spring sports, sports day and House basketball, to music competitions, fair trade poster design, art competitions, the great Bloomfield Bake Off and bunting design making, to name a few. Competitions are open to everyone and take place either in curriculum time or can be done in a students' own time, depending on the activity. The results of these competitions combined with the points received by students for effort in and around school, are concluded with the awarding of the House Cup to the overall winners at the end of the year.

Sporting Clubs

RBA has a huge pedigree in sport which has seen us take district, county, regional and national titles over the years. However, whilst we stretch our highly able students to achieve their best, our approach to extra-curricular clubs is very much an inclusive one. We offer sports such as Football, Netball, Hockey, Basketball, Cross-Country/Fitness, Cricket, Athletics, Rounders and Rugby for all our students. In addition, we offer bespoke sport inclusion opportunities to students who may struggle with more traditional sports, these include Boccia, Curling & Table Cricket.



Other Extra-Curricular Opportunities

Whilst we clearly offer a huge amount of opportunities in our performance based subject areas, we do have a rich diet on offer for our students across all areas of the school. We have academic clubs such as Study Club which offer students the chance to gain support with homework tasks. Other clubs include Debate club, Cheerleading, Drama, Warhammer, Model making, Maths club, Classic Disney drawing, Historical fashion, Chess and CAD amongst many, many more – there is something for everyone.



Performing Arts Clubs (Including Music)

Like sport, we have a huge offer of inclusive opportunities in our Performing Arts department, and like sport we also have a rich history of producing talent. We have had numerous students go on to perform both on the west end, but also in movies. All of our students can access clubs in Dance, Drama, Gymnastics and Cheerleading, in addition to our numerous music clubs, including Orchestra's and be-spoke instrument tuition. We host numerous annual concerts and performances, including our ensemble and beginner's music concerts, and our Gym & Dance Display, along with our 100+ cast production. .

WHOLE SCHOOL PRODUCTION

Our annual whole school production is always a huge success. Students across all four year groups, work together to put on a spectacular musical performance. Our sell out performances run over 3 consecutive evenings and we also enjoy performing a matinee show to our local lower schools.

Some of the productions we have wowed audiences with so far are:

Oliver, Bugsy Malone, The Jungle Book, Aladdin, Beauty and the Beast, The Little Mermaid, Mary Poppins, the Lion King, Frozen, Matilda and High School Musical.



When do students rehearse?

Taking part in the whole school production is an honour but also extremely hard work. All rehearsals are during lunchtimes and after school, we even come to school on Saturdays to practice. Students will be required to learn lines from scripts at home, and practice their singing and dancing ready for each rehearsal. Auditions are held prior to rehearsals commencing. Students interested in backstage areas are welcome to support with; lighting, sound, and in the props and costume department.

Whole School Assemblies

PSHE (Personal, Social, Health & Economic Education)

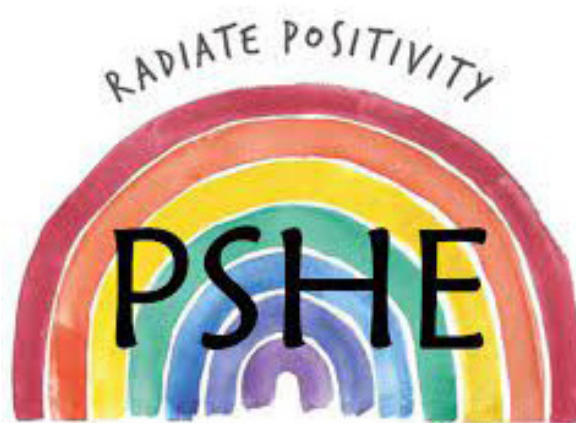
Research shows that students who are emotionally healthy do better at school. PSHE education helps children and young people to achieve their potential by supporting their wellbeing and tackling issues that can affect their ability to learn, such as anxiety and unhealthy relationships. PSHE education also helps students to develop skills and aptitudes; like teamwork, communication, and resilience, that are crucial to navigating the challenges and opportunities of the modern world, and are increasingly valued by employers.

PSHE boasts a flexible curriculum in that it has to reflect, respond adapt to the changes in the world and communities around us. We want our students to be well-rounded, happy individuals who are equipped with skills for life as an adult in British society. This is achieved through a curriculum that has been designed to incorporate three main core areas: 'Health and Wellbeing', 'Relationships',



and 'Living in the Wider World'. In addition, learning also comprises economic wellbeing, careers and enterprise education, as well as education for personal safety, including assessing and managing risk.

Where possible, external learning resources are used to enrich and enhance the curriculum delivered by Robert Bloomfield staff. An example of this; Resources from St. John's Ambulance are used to further students' knowledge and understanding of basic first aid, whilst in Year 8 students have the opportunity to practice CPR training in school. Towards the end of the academic year, parents, guardians and students in Year 5 are invited to attend an information evening led by health education workers. The purpose of the evening is to provide information and about puberty and a relaxed setting as well as offering support and advice.



BIKEABILITY

Bikeability is the government's national cycle training programme. The scheme aims to inspire more students to cycle by equipping them with the skills and confidence to ride more.

The students have four 2-hour sessions across a week with the first session on the playground and the subsequent lessons in the local area. Using our local residential roads, students experience real road cycling including how to start and stop journeys; how to pass stationary vehicles; what road signals, signs and markings mean; how to negotiate junctions; and how to share the road safely with other road users.

Completing this course not only equips our students to be safe whilst cycling but also increases their confidence in their own skills and their understanding of the world around them.

This funded course is offered to our year six students free of charge and anyone who wishes to take part may do so.

All activities are run by fully trained instructors and are located within Norfolk Lake's outstanding facilities. Norfolk Lakes set in 65 peaceful acres on the edge of the village of Lyng, 11 miles north west of Norwich and has 37 acres of lakes offering a safe environment to enjoy water sports.

All meals, accommodation and transport are included in the package. This centre offers fantastic, modern, comfortable accommodation, with shared en-suite dorms.

What do the students get out of the trip?

For a lot of students this will be their first opportunity to spend time away from home. As a result, they will gain new experiences which help to boost self-confidence and independence. Students will be able to enhance their team building skills while trying out new and exciting activities as well as laugh with friends new and old, all in the place that matters most - the great outdoors.



They can also challenge themselves by trying out new adventure activities and test their resilience.

We have been visiting Elemental, a water sports company for many years now and we continue to return due to the outstanding facilities, instructors and their ability to accommodate our consistent large numbers. We take around 180-200 students every year to Cornwall to experience the beauty of Newquay, the waves and all the fun and activities that can be enjoyed there.

This is the biggest residential trip that RBA runs and it's popularity is evident by the large demand we get each year. On this trip, students take part in a variety of water sports, including surfing, body boarding and kayaking, as well as coastering, raft building, beach games and a visit to a theme park and swimming pool. All meals and accommodation are included.

What do the students get out of the trip?

Sea, sand....and often sun!

The students gain a whole range of amazing experiences on this trip. Not only do they develop their independence, social skills and team building, they also conquer many fears and try things they did not think they could do. This has countless impacts on their self-esteem and confidence.

We witness students encourage each other past their own personal boundaries and come together as a team.

We spend every evening on the local beach which is only 200m from our hotel, where students enjoy the freedom of being with their friends in a beautiful setting, which they would not get to experience here at home.



YEAR 7 & 8 | SKI TRIP



Which year groups are invited?

The ski trip is for KS3 students. All students will get 2 opportunities to attend the trip during their 4-year journey.

When: Once a year in January/February

Where are we going? Les Menuires, French Alps

Our annual ski trip dates back over 15 years, and has been a huge success over this period. Historically, we would travel to a range of destinations, however over the past 7 years we have returned to Les Menuires in France with SkiBound due to this resort meeting the needs of all our students, regardless of ability or experience. The trip has grown and grown over the years, and we are now the 2nd biggest school ski trip in the UK, boasting well over 100 students every year. We also have 3 members of staff qualified as Ski Trip leaders, and it is the experience of our staff and helpers that aid the smooth running of such a fantastic trip.



What do the students get out of the trip?

The Ski Trip is so much more than just learning to ski, or developing your skiing skills. For many students this is their first trip abroad, away from their parents, and therefore they learn how to be independent, organised and to look after themselves and others. The trip also encourages students to work together and support each other in an environment that is alien to them. Whilst the enjoyment of learning how to ski, or to improve, is paramount, the sense of achievement and self-esteem is evident on a daily basis.

YEAR 8 | FRENCH TRIP

Where: Château d'Eblinghem,
St Omer, Northern France



Year 8s have an exceptional opportunity to learn about the culture, history and heritage of France during their trip to France. The trip is targeted towards students who have a real love of languages and have the ambition to study French at GCSE.

For our stay we are fortunate enough to be based at the beautiful Château d'Eblinghem. The château is ideal for school groups as it is located in a rural location just 8km east of St Omer on the Opal Coast in Northern France, and just 45 minutes from the Channel ports.

During their stay, the students have a 45 min workshop at the Chocolaterie de Beussent, a visit to the Boulangerie Wierre Effroy, a town trail of St Omer, as well as a day at Parc Asterix. They also have evening activities such as pancake making and some tasting of traditional French dishes: des escargots! (snails).
